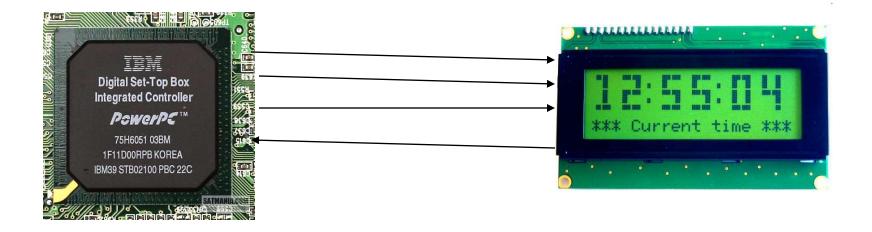

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What is SPI?

- Serial Peripheral Interface (SPI)
 - Serial Bus protocol (developed by Motorola)
 - Fast, Easy to use, Simple
 - \odot Everyone supports it





SPI Basics

- A communication protocol using 4 wires
 Also known as a 4 wire bus
- Used to communicate across small distances
- Multiple Slaves, Single Master
- Synchronized
- Capabilities
 - Always Full Duplex

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- Communicating in two directions at the same time
- Transmission need not be meaningful
- \circ Multiple Mbps transmission speed
- $\,\circ\,$ Transfers data in 4 to 16 bit characters Multiple slaves

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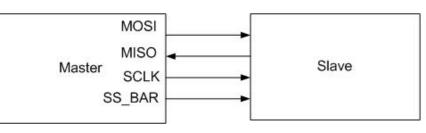
Daisy-chaining possible

SPI Protocol

Wires:

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- MOSI: Master Out Slave In
- MISO: Master In Slave Out
- \circ SCLK: System Clock
- o SS_BAR:Slave Select 1...N



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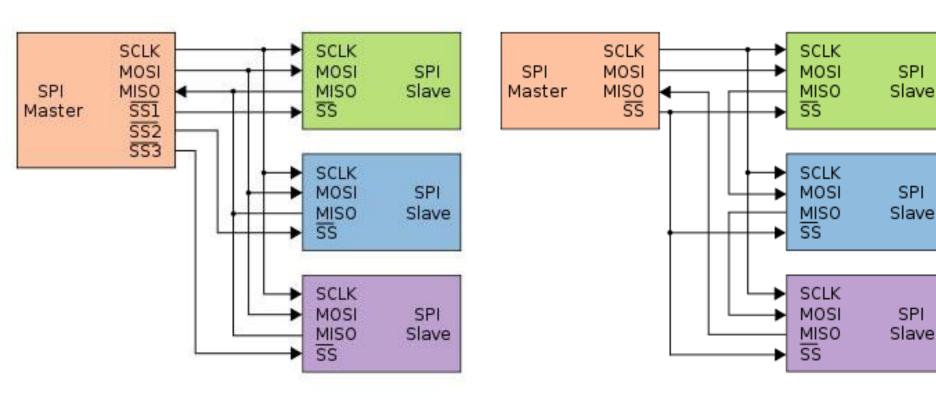
- Master Set Slave Select low
- Master Generates Clock

Clock Phase

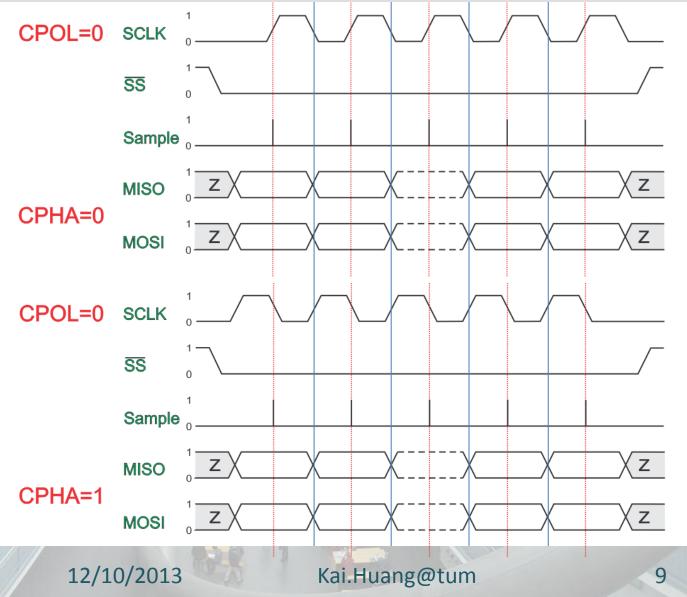
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- Two phases and two polarities of clock
 o Four modes defined by
 - CPOL (Clock POLarity)
 - CPHA (Clock PHAse)
- Master and selected slave must be in same mode
- Master must change polarity and phase to communicate with slaves of different numbers

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CPOL=0: Base value of the clock is zero

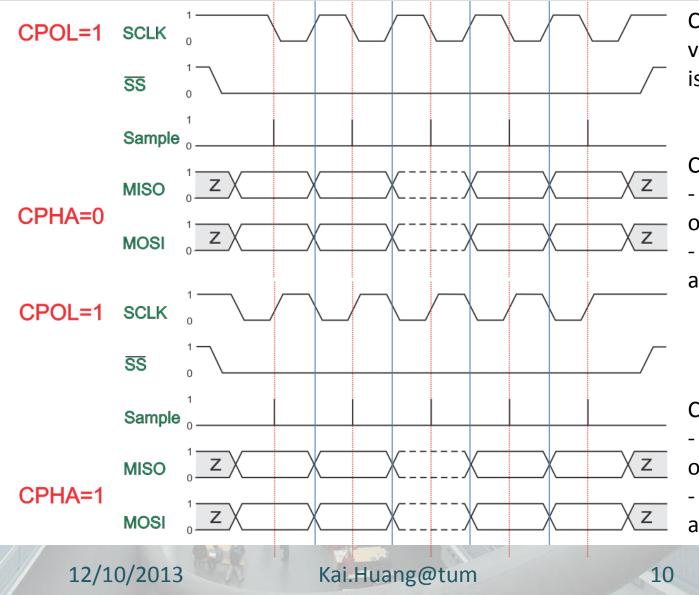

Pros and Cons

- Pros:
 - \circ Fast and easy
 - Fast for point-to-point connections
 - Easily allows streaming/Constant data inflow
 - No addressing/Simple to implement
 - Everyone supports it
- Cons:
 - \odot SS makes multiple slaves very complicated

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- \circ No acknowledgement ability
- No inherent arbitration
- \circ No flow control

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What is CAN?

- CAN (Controller Area Network) was developed in 1983 by Bosch
- CAN is a multi-master broadcast serial bus
 - All devices on the network receive every bit of information sent on the BUS
- CAN is message-based (each message is uniquely identified by an ID)
 - o Event triggered
- CAN uses CSMA/CR for media access control
- Typically used in automotive and automation tasks/scenarios





Why is CAN used?

- Simple Transmission Medium
 - Twisted pair of wires is the standard, but also just one wire will work
- Excellent Error Handling
 - $\,\circ\,$ CRC error detection mechanism
- Fault Confinement
 - $\,\circ\,$ Built-in feature to prevent faulty node to block system
- Maximum bitrates depend on bus length
- Mature Standard
 - $\circ~$ CAN protocol more than 16 years
 - Numerous CAN products and tools on the market
 - o ISO 11898

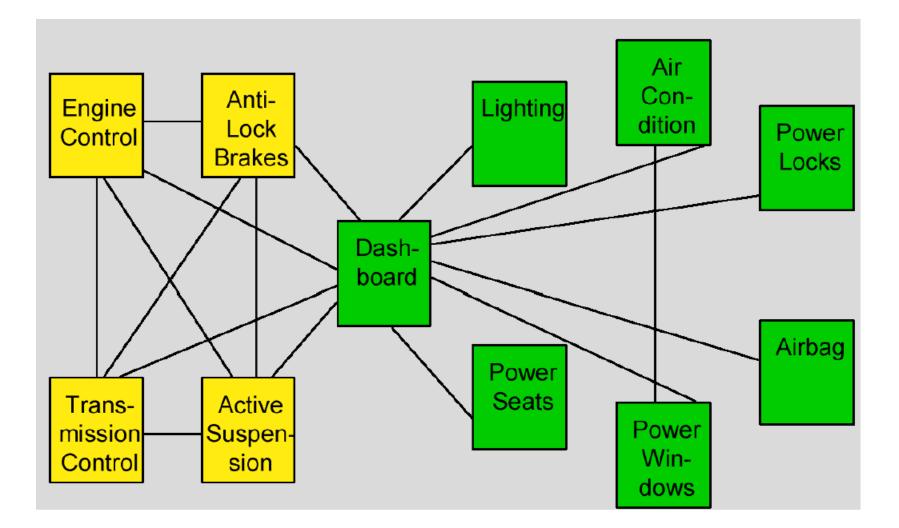

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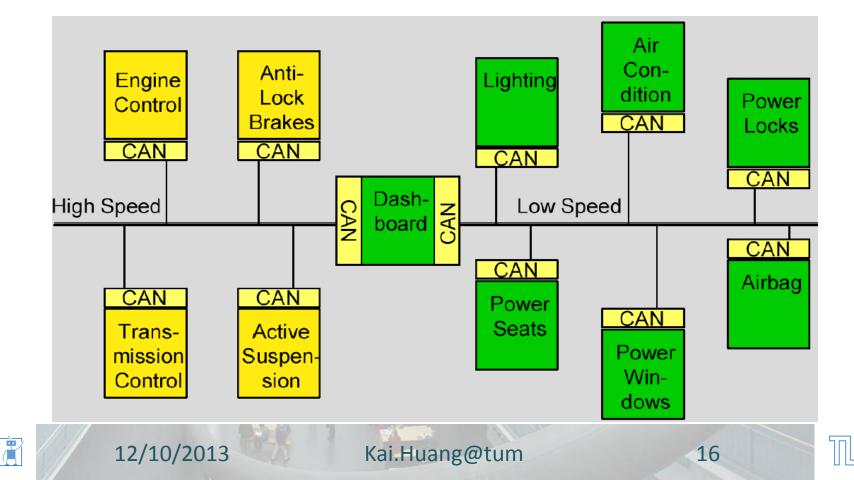
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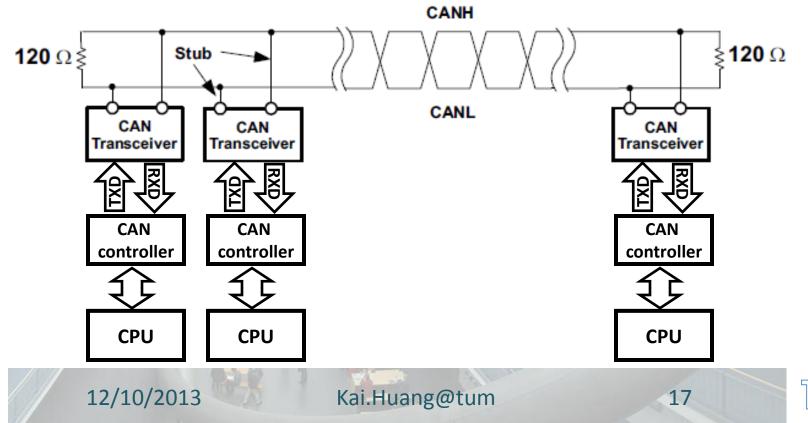
With CAN

 Point-to-point wiring is replaced by one serial bus connecting all control systems



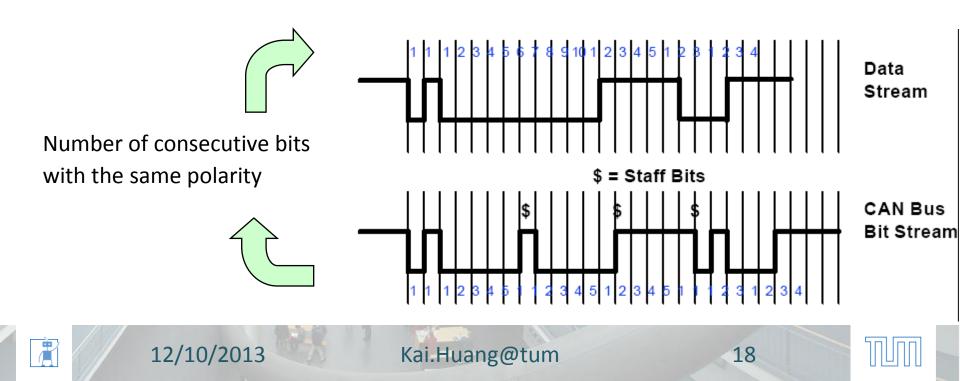
Basic Configuration

- Terminated on each side by a 120 Ohm resistor
- A simple 2-wire differential serial bus



Bit Coding & Bit Stuffing

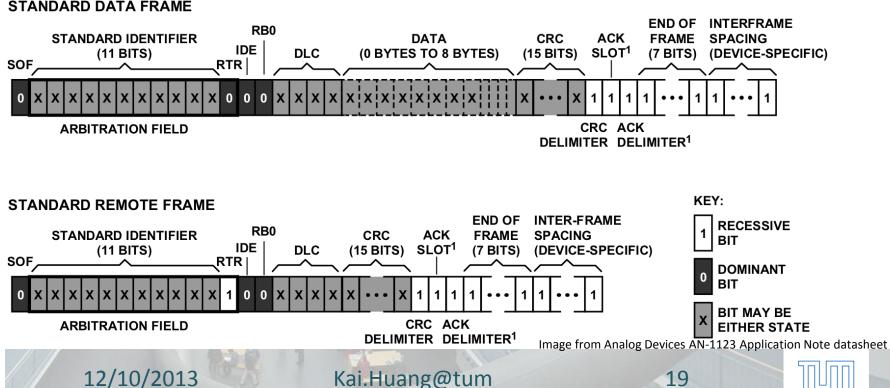
- Bit Coding : NRZ (Non-Return-To-Zero code) does not ensure enough edges for synchronization
- Stuff Bits are inserted after 5 consecutive bits of the same level
- Stuff Bits have the inverse level of the previous bit.
- No deterministic encoding, frame length depends on transmitted data



CAN Standard Message Frame Fields

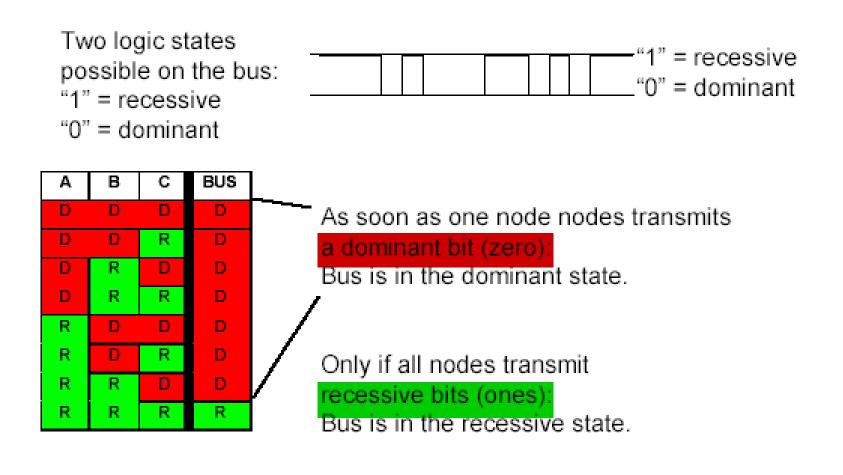
Four types of frames:

- Data frame: Used for data transmission
- Remote frame: Used for requesting data Ο
- Error frame: Used to notify errors 0
- Overload frame: Enforces delay before next data or remote frame 0

Wired AND



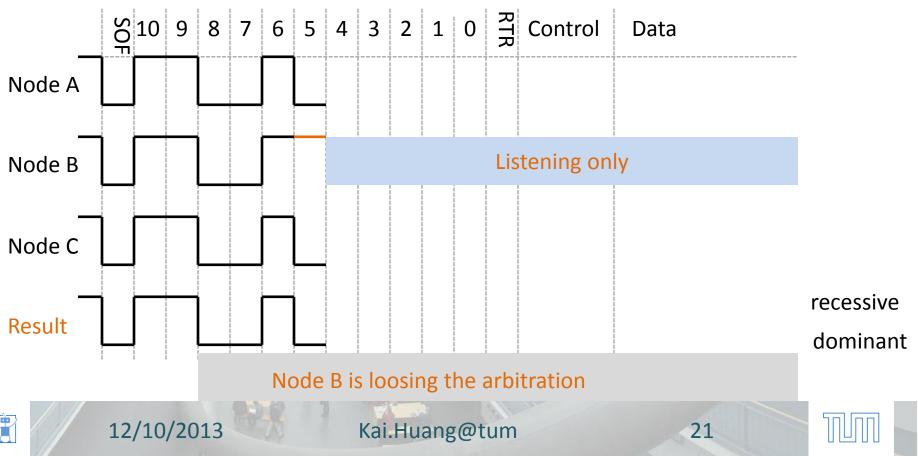
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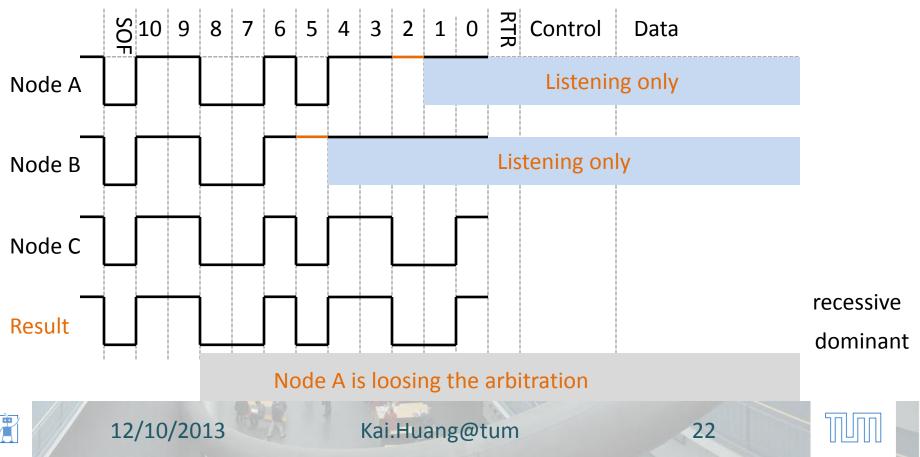
Arbitration Scheme

- CAN implements an arbitration scheme based on message identifiers to achieve collision avoidance
- Transmitted bits are either dominant (typically 0) or recessive (1).



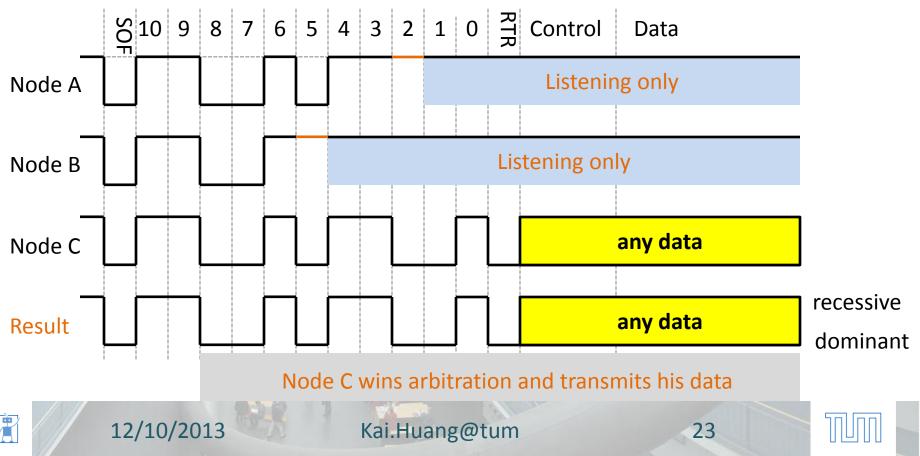
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SocketCAN

- CAN bus stack for the Linux kernel, contributed by a team at Volkswagen Research
 - From an application point-of-view this is great news, as it means that CAN bus is handled by the well know Berkley sockets APIs and you have full software portability

- Commands:
 - \circ ip: control the CAN interface
 - \odot candump: record the packages on a CAN interface

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What is FlexRay ?

 FlexRay Consortium (2000-2010): BMW, Daimler, Motorola (Freescale), Philips (NXP), Bosch, GM, VW



- Combination of a TDMA and the Byteflight [Byteflight Consortium, 2003] (Flexible TDMA, close to CSMA/CA) protocol
- FlexRay currently under conversion into ISO standard
- Operation principle:
 - $\,\circ\,$ Cycle is subdivided into a static and a dynamic segment.
 - Static segment is based on a fixed allocation of time slots to nodes.
 - Dynamic segment for transmission of ad-hoc communication with variable bandwidth requirements.

Why FlexRay ?

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- High data rates can be achieved:

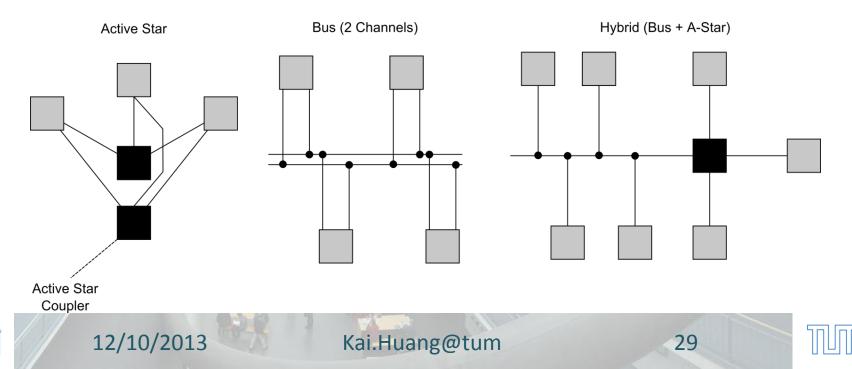
 initially targeted for ~ 10Mbit/sec;
 design allows much higher data rates
- Time- and event-triggered data packages
- Fault-tolerant (redundant channels, e.g. for Xby-wire systems)
- Used by premium cars (e.g. Audi A8, BMW X5)

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Basic topologies

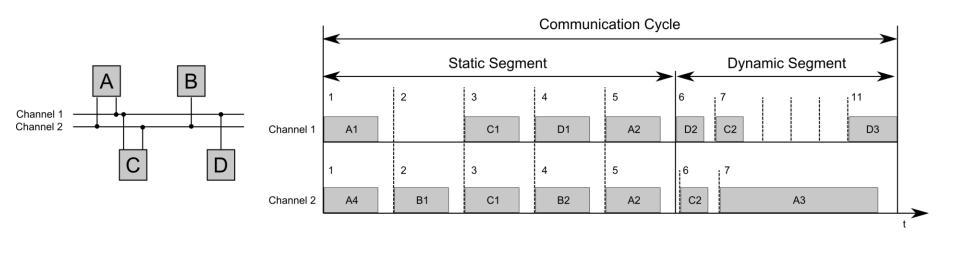
- Typical Network-Topology: Active Star
- Bus or hybrid topologies are also possible
- 1 or 2 channel topology depending on fault tolerance / bandwidth requirements
- Use of two independent channels to eliminate single-point failures



Communication

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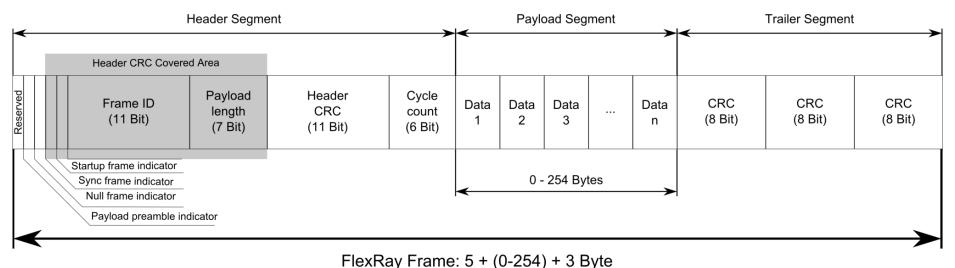
- FlexRay communication is divided in:
 - $\,\circ\,$ a static segment: Deterministic media access based on TDMA
 - a dynamic segment: Non-deterministic media access based on FTDMA (Flexible Time Division Multiple Access)
- Time base is established at wake-up of control units



Frame Format

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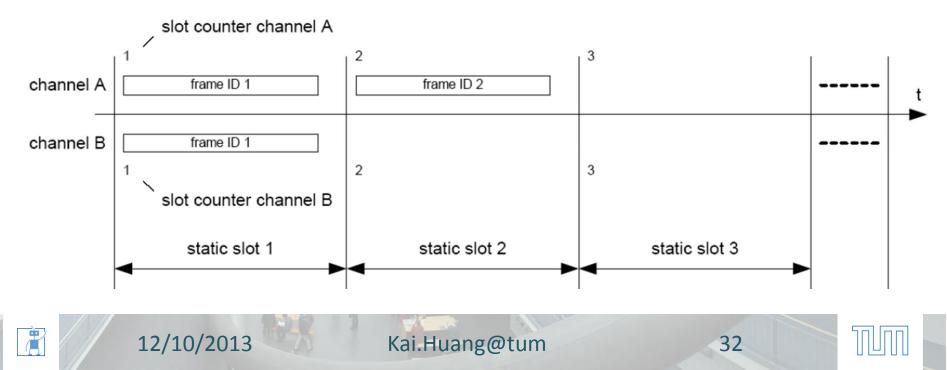
- A FlexRay frame is divided into three segments: Header, Paypload and Trailer
- Variable payload length from 0 to 254 Bytes
- CRC for header (partly) and payload
- Frame ID: Defines the slot in which the frame should be transmitted (Range: 1-2047, ID 0 is an invalid frame ID)
- Payload Length: Payload data bytes



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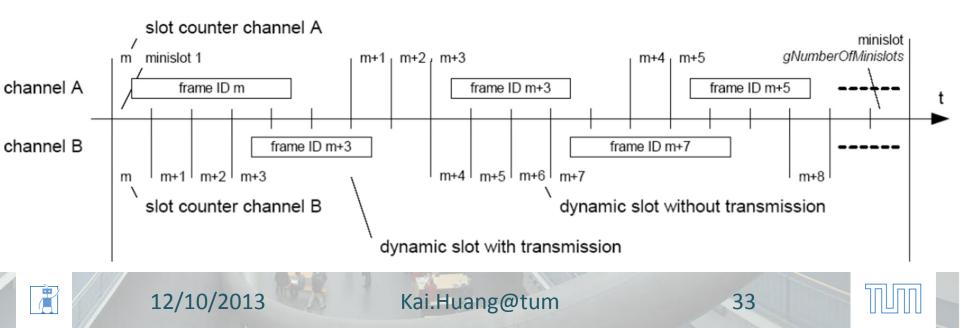
Static Segment (TDMA)

- all static slots are the same length whether used or not
- all slots are repeated in order every communication cycle
- slots are lock-stepped in order on both channels



Dynamic Segment

- Each minislot is an opportunity to send a message
- If message isn't sent, minislot elapses unused (short idle period)
- All nodes watch whether a message is sent so they can count minislots



FlexRay Tradeoffs

- Advantages
 - Probably has primitives necessary for critical x-by-wire applications
 - $\circ~$ Static segment provides timing guarantees and some fault tolerance
 - Dynamic segment gives flexibility for event triggered messages
 - Big industry consortium behind it
 - It's "flexible"

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- Disadvantages
 - $\circ~$ Relatively new protocol these things take time to mature
 - For example, no fault hypothesis published upon which to build safety case
 - $\circ~$ Does not provide as complete a set of primitives as TTP
 - Group membership is an application problem, but will be needed for x-by-wire

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• Any safety critical operation on host might complicate safety case

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- Others
 - Time triggered Ethernet is coming ...
